HSTORY

The Zoo began as Wade Park in 1882 after Jeptha H. Wade donated 73 - acres of land and 14 deer to the City of Cleveland. By 1907, however, Cleveland City Council had laid plans to build the Cleveland Museum of Art and decided to move the Zoo to its current location.

Did you know...? The Zoo was originally located near Wade Oval in Cleveland's University Circle.

The animals kept in the early Zoo were mostly of local origin, but the next 30 years saw the building of the Zoo's first Monkey Island, sea lion pools and bear exhibit before the Cleveland Museum of Natural History assumed control in 1940. In November 1940, a new Asian elephant arrived at the Zoo.

In 1955, Zoo staff and supporters organized an African safari and obtained three elephants, two hippos, two rhinos, three giraffes, and many smaller animals. A year later, the Zoo's Pachyderm Building opened to house many of the animals acquired on the safari.

Did you know...? Breeding and conservation programs supply the world's zoos with enough animals for almost all new exhibits.

In 1957, the Cleveland Zoological Society assumed control of the Zoo. In January of 1959, heavy rains and melting

snow caused Big Creek to overflow, and the resulting flood wiped out the Zoo's reptile collection and damaged many buildings. The Zoo recovered by 1962, however, and moated lion and tiger exhibits were added.

In 1968, the City of Cleveland transferred ownership of the Zoo to the Cleveland Metropolitan Park District, and the Cleveland Zoological Society transferred management of the Zoo to **Cleveland Metroparks** in 1975.

Also in 1975, construction began on The Primate & Cat Building, and it was during this time the Zoo's original building, the Wade Park Deer Barn, was moved from Wade Park and placed on Zoo grounds.

Did you know...? Wade Memorial Hall, located next to Waterfowl Lake, is the old Wade Park Deer Barn. Today it is a Victorian-style ice cream parlor.

In 1982, Cleveland Metroparks Zoo received accreditation from the Association of Zoos & Aquariums (AZA). In 1985, a portion of the Cat and Primate Building was renovated after the Cleveland Aquarium in Gordon Park announced it was closing permanently, and its collection of fish and invertebrates was moved to the Zoo.

Since 1989, many themed exhibits have opened under the leadership of Zoo Director **Steve Taylor**. In 1992,

Cleveland Metroparks Zoo welcomed The RainForest, followed by **Wolf Wilderness** in 1997, **Australian Adventure** in 2000, and **The Sarah Allison Steffee Center for Zoological Medicine** in 2004. On May 5, 2011 **African Elephant Crossing** debuted featuring a state-of-the-art elephant exhibit spread over 5 acres of lightly wooded grasslands.

Did you know...? When The RainForest opened in 1992, it featured the Zoo's first permanent reptile collection since the flood of 1959.

TOO DIVISIONS

Zoological Programs: Zoological Programs ensure the safety, well-being, and enrichment of all Zoo animals, every day of the year.

Conservation Education: The Zoo's Conservation Education Division is responsible for education and conservation programs. The Zoo is a living classroom offering programs for all ages and interests, from overnight camps to college courses. Each program targets a particular age group. Biofacts and/or live animals provide an up-close, "hands on" experience that will be both enjoyable and memorable. And, teacher resources are available year-round. Zoo volunteers and Zoo Crew (teen volunteers) assist staff at locations throughout the Zoo. The Zoo's Conservation & Science program was created to develop, coordinate and support conservation and research projects in the following primary ways: (1) to support wildlife conservation regionally and around the world, (2) to improve management, health and welfare of zoo animals using science, (3) to serve as a training ground and resource for students and professional colleagues, and (4) to foster collaborative conservation and research efforts among zoological parks, academic institutions, conservation organizations and government agencies.

Facility Operations: The Facility Operations Division has three departments – General Maintenance, Service Maintenance Days & Nights, and Horticulture. General Maintenance: repairs, maintains and renovates Zoo exhibits and building & grounds infrastructure. Service Maintenance: cleans the buildings & grounds, empties landfill & recycling containers, sets up and tears down events, mows the grass and clears snow. Horticulture: cares for all flora on Zoo grounds including the Public Greenhouse and two working greenhouses.

Guest Services: The Zoo's Guest Services Division is responsible for several areas: Operations handles transportation, guest satisfaction and safety, and ensures that our guests have an enjoyable visit. Group Sales representatives assist guests with facility rentals, birthday parties, Good Any Day tickets, and group rentals. Zoo Admissions is responsible for all ticketing and revenue for the Zoo. Zoo concessionaires, ARAMARK (refreshment stands) and Event Network (gift shops) report to Zoo Guest Services and work in conjunction with our Zoo mission and goals.

Marketing and Public Relations: Marketing and Public Relations promotes the Zoo throughout the region, coordinating advertising, media relations and special events.

AFRICAN SAVANNA

Take a safari through the grassy plains of the African Savanna. Observe lions, giraffes, zebras, gazelles and a variety of African birds. On Monkey Island, see colobus monkeys, and nearby, see black rhinos.



Don't miss the new 5 acre, state-of-the-art elephant facility and exhibit, African Elephant Crossing.

Visit Sarah Allison Steffee Center for Zoological Medicine, the Zoo's veterinary medical facility and research center. Explore the Reinberger Learning Lab and experience a day in the life of a zookeeper and zoo veterinarian.

Look for the following exhibits and features in African Savanna: African plains, flamingos, leopard, lions, Rising Waters Safari Camp, Savanna Ridge and the playground.

- Location: Enter Welcome Plaza and turn right.
- Purpose: African animals.
- Restrooms and family restrooms: By the Sarah Allison Steffee Center and inside African Elephant Exhibit.

- Animals: Colobus monkeys, zebras, giraffes, ostriches, rhinos, lions, leopard, and elephants.

AUSTRALIAN ADVENTURE

Australian Adventure is a fascinating 8-acre exhibit. Kangaroos and wallabies roam freely in Wallaby Walkabout. Kookaburra Station features a contact yard with Merino sheep, goats and other farm animals.

The Reinberger Homestead is fashioned after a traditional 19th century sheep station offering visitors a peek into Australian home life. Nearby, the 55-foot Yagga Tree contains small animal exhibits, a giant snake slide and educational displays.

AUSTRALIAN ADVENTURE

Note: Australian Adventure is open April 1 through October 31 and weather permitting from November - March. Koalas and tree kangaroos reside in GumLeaf Hideout which is open all year. Look for the following exhibits and features in Australian Adventure: Ballarat Theatre, Boomerang Railway, singing dogs, camel rides, GumLeaf Hideout and Lorikeet Landing.

- Location: Across from GumLeaf Hideout.
- Purpose: Australian ranch providing a glimpse of 19th century life.

NORTHERN TREK

Northern Trek is home to cold climate animals including one of the largest collections of bear species in North America. Also discover tigers, reindeer, Bactrian camels, harbor seals and sea lions.



Wolf Wilderness gives visitors a comprehensive look into the environment and wildlife of a northern temperate forest. Wolf Lodge anchors the exhibit and serves as an education and viewing center for Mexican gray wolves, beavers and a variety of wetland species. Look for the following exhibits and features in Northern Trek: North America black bears, and a polar bear.

- Location: If entering at Welcome Plaza, continue to the right, go past African Savanna, and follow path and banners to Northern Trek. If entering at Northern Trek entrance, area flows both directions to exhibits.

PRIMATE, CAT & AQUATICS BUILDING

The Primate, Cat & Aquatics Building features one of the largest collections of primate species in North America, including gorillas and lemurs. (Some primate species are also on exhibit in other areas of the Zoo.)

PRIMATE, CAT & AQUATICS BUILDING

Two male gorillas roam the outdoor gorilla exhibit during the warm weather months. Nearby, some of the Zoo's slowest moving animals, Aldabra tortoises, spend the summer in an outdoor exhibit area across from the Zoo's speediest animals, the cheetahs.

Also see rare snow leopards, lemurs, giant elephant shrews, and 32 different displays of salt and freshwater life including sharks, piranha, giant Pacific octopus and living coral.

- Location: Top of Fulton Parkway and Wildlife Way inside Zoo grounds.
- Purpose: Houses large cats, primates and aquatic life.
- Emergency Telephone: Located outside main doors on the right hand side.
- Restrooms: Right side of Primate, Cat & Aquatics Building and by the Ranger Station.

THE RAINFOREST

The RainForest showcases more 10,000 plants and over 600 animals from the jungles of Asia, Africa and the Americas. This unique 2 - acre, two-level exhibit is one of the largest of its kind in the country.

The RainForest's naturalistic settings include a 25 - foot waterfall, a research hut, the Discovery Center, a tropical rainstorm exhibit with thunder and lightning effects, a donation station and other interactive exhibits.

THE RAINFOREST













 Location: Near the Ticket Plaza, it is the building with a dome roof.

THE RAINFOREST

- Purpose: Home to 600 animals and 10,000 plants from the jungles of Africa, Asia, and the Americas.
 The RainForest features state-of-the-art interactive exhibits and a tropical rainstorm.
- Emergency Telephone: Seek out a Guest Services associate to use their radio.
- Restrooms: One restroom next to the Amazon Café, one upstairs and one behind The RainForest building in the back parking lot.
- Drinking Fountains: By the restrooms, upstairs and downstairs.
- Animals: Tropical birds, lizards and other reptiles, insects, orangutans, otters.
- Food & Shopping: Amazon Café and Marketplace are open 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. daily & 7 p.m. on weekends and holidays from Memorial Day through Labor Day.



WATERFOWL LAKE

Waterfowl Lake is NOT your typical lake. Observe majestic birds of prey in large outdoor flight cages. During the summer months, keep an eye out for flamingos, gibbons, lemurs and more.

WATERFOWL LAKE

Relax by the lake at Wade Hall, one of the oldest Zoo buildings in North America. Wander through the Public Greenhouse to enjoy hundreds of tropical plant displays that change with the seasons.

And, just a short flutter from Waterfowl Lake, you'll find Free Flight Falls. This lovely year-round outdoor exhibit offers secluded viewing of birds and butterflies with a beautiful waterfall backdrop. Look for the following exhibits and features in Waterfowl Lake: Birds of prey, and the Public Greenhouse.

WATERFOWL LAKE, WADE HALL & GREENHOUSE







- Location: Walk through Welcome Plaza up the small incline toward the Birds of Prey Exhibit, and turn right. The lake is right behind Wade Hall. The Greenhouse is directly across from Wade Hall.
- **Purpose:** Home to flamingos, birds, ducks and geese.
- **Restrooms:** Across from the Greenhouse.
- **Drinking Fountains:** In front of Wild Wings Tent.
- Animals: Flamingos, and a variety of birds.
- Food: Ben and Jerry's Ice Cream located inside Wade Hall. (Seasonal)

ZOO INTRODUCES QUARTERS FOR CONSERVATION

Program will help direct funds to worldwide conservation efforts

Cleveland Metroparks Zoo supports many important conservation projects around the world, from North America and the Caribbean to Africa and Asia. This year, guests can take a direct role in those efforts by helping the Zoo decide where its conservation funds should go with "Quarters for Conservation."

Beginning April 1 winter rates end and regular rates return and with each admission sold visitors will receive a token representing a "Quarter for Conservation." Guests then use their token at a kiosk display to "vote" for one of three ongoing Zoo field projects including:

"Gorilla Conservation: Supporting People – Protecting Wildlife" in the Nouabale-Ndoki National Park, Republic of Congo, Africa. In conjunction with the Wildlife Conservation Society, this project helps train Congolese researchers and wildlife officers working on gorilla field research and habitat protection in northern Congo and funds conservation education in local schools around the national park.

"Black Rhino Conservation: Saving an Endangered Species" in the Moremi Game Reserve, Botswana, Africa. Funding

for this project with the International Rhino Foundation will help relocate rhinos from South Africa to protected areas in Botswana, monitor rhinos after their release using radiotelemetry and help employ local community members as rhino monitors and scouts.

"Conserving Species and Habitats in Our Own Back Yard" in Cleveland Metroparks around Northeast Ohio. Funding for this project, with the park district, supports surveys of Big Creek and surrounding tributaries to locate populations of Bigmouth shiner, a threatened native fish species, monitors local bat populations and allows for the continuation of regional conservation projects enhance and restore important habitats in the area.

Look for collection receptacles at the Zoo Main Gate and Northern Trek entrances.

The Zoo is now SMOKE FREE – Employees and volunteers who must smoke will be permitted to do so on their breaks and lunches <u>only</u> AND in one of the two designated smoking locations; Behind Matilda's Grill or the Operations Trailer. Remember you must be out of the view of the public. Guests are not permitted to smoke inside the Zoo, only in the parking lot.

Cleveland Metroparks Zoo does not provide straws or drink lids to keep in line with our mission to maintain a healthy, natural environment for our animals and quests.

Please ensure that guests keep our waterways clean and safe for the animals and for everyone to enjoy. Smoking is not permitted in the Zoo to ensure the health of our animals and guests and to reduce litter within the park.

ALUMINUM CAN RECYCLING



When we throw things 'away,' they go to a landfill.

By doing this, we make a negative impact on the environment because we lose the natural resources that were used to manufacture those materials.

Most of these natural resources cannot be replaced – for example, the rocks from which metals are mined. So if we keep on using and throwing 'away' resources in this way, eventually they will run out. Aluminum is the most valuable material in the trash stream.

Recyclable materials have to be separated out from the rest of the trash and sent to reprocessors, companies who turn the materials back into usable products.

- Aluminum never wears out, it can be recycled forever.
- Recycling one aluminum can saves enough energy to run a television for three hours.
- Aluminum cans are the most recycled beverage container in the world. An awesome 105,784 cans are recycled every minute nationwide.

The Zoo collects and recycles aluminum cans (beverage

type containers) through its Cans For Conservation program. In addition to the recycle bins around the park, several times a year, the Zoo has special collections to raise money from recycling those cans to be used for animal and habitat restoration projects locally and globally, such as the Eastern plains garter snake, Panamanian golden frog, Turtle Survival Alliance, Polar Bear International, Snow Leopard Trust, Friends of Big Creek, Kinabatangan Orangutan Project, Cheetah Conservation – Kenya, Mbeli Bai Gorilla Project, Western Cuyahoga Audubon Society, and International Rhino Foundation.

PAPER RECYCLING

Here's how everyone can get in on the act: Look for a green and yellow Paper Retriever® bin, conveniently located at the rear of the Zoo's main entrance parking lot, and toss in piles of unwanted paper. Almost any type of paper can be deposited: office paper, school paper, newspaper, construction paper, magazines, catalogs, junk mail, notebooks, soft-cover books, writing tablets, shredded paper (contained in plastic bags). The paper will be 100% recycled and made into newsprint. The Paper Retriever® program pays Cleveland Metroparks Zoo for every ton of paper collected.

So just follow the signs from the Zoo entrance to the colorful green/yellow Paper Retriever® Bin and make a waste-paper contribution. It costs nothing, but the reward to the Zoo and the environment is priceless.

CELL PHONE RECYCLING Answer the Call of the Wild!

Wait! Stop! Don't throw that old cell phone away. Bring any type of cell phone and cell phone accessories (including rechargeable batteries) to Cleveland Metroparks Zoo. A recycling box for cell phones is located inside the Zoo's Exhibit Hall to the left as you enter the main plaza.

There are plenty of reasons to recycle your old cell phone. Cell phones contain a number of hazardous substances including lead, cadmium and arsenic. If not recycled, these substances may cause serious threats to environmental and human health. And, cell phone recycling is an easy way to support Cleveland Metroparks Zoo.

Cleveland Metroparks Zoo partners with several cell phone recyclers: Envirocellular, and CPC, LLC. The recyclers sell usable phones to companies that refurbish and reuse them. Unusable phones are disassembled and safely recycled by a North American EPA-certified recycler. The funds generated by this program will support Zoo recycling projects.

Important Note: It is the responsibility of the donating party to cancel or switch service on the phone and to delete any data such as phone numbers, text messages, pictures, e-mails, documents, etc. that might be on the cell phone.

INKJET/TONER PRINTER CARTRIDGE RECYCLING

The Zoo collects name-brand (i.e. HP, Lexmark, Dell, Canon, etc.) inkjet and toner printer cartridges to be reconditioned, reused or recycled.

For every ink jet and toner cartridge that can be recycled, the Zoo gets a small donation with proceeds going to future recycling initiatives. The drop off location is in the Zoo's Exhibit Hall just inside the main entrance.

ZOOPOO COMPOST

What do we do with all the poo? Recycle it and sell it, of course! As part of a comprehensive on-grounds conservation program in cooperation with area composters, the Zoo processes approximately 3,000 cubic yards of manure, hay, straw, wood shavings, woodchips, herbaceous material and leaves. At our windrow composting facility, we produce mounds of the richest, sweet smelling, and most exotic soil amendment in Northeast Ohio. Zoo horticulturists use the compost to prepare spectacular gardens throughout the Zoo's 183 acres.

Every spring and fall, the community has the opportunity to purchase a bulk scoop or smaller quantities of the rich

'camel, elephant, giraffe, kangaroo, reindeer, rhino, and zebra' compost known as ZooPoo Compost. For just \$40 a cubic yard (non tax-deductible) -- \$55 for two yards -- the compost is loaded into your pickup truck. You may purchase smaller quantities if you bring your own container (we'll supply the shovels) -- fill a 32-gallon garbage can for \$15 or a 5-gallon bucket for \$5.

All sales must be prepaid and can be ordered through the Cleveland Zoological Society website or call (216) 661-6500 to order in April for a May pick-up or order in September for an October pick-up. This is a 'poo'-pular program! In previous years all sales have completely sold out, so buy early.
